Scholarship to give students who struggle financially an equal opportunity for education

Honoring his wife's wish to provide scholarship opportunities so that students who struggle financially have an equal opportunity to pursue higher education, Midlander Jack E. Brown has generously funded the "**Frances Brown Endowed Scholarship**" at Midland College.

The scholarship reflects the interests of both Frances and Jack Brown, major philanthropists who enjoy contributing to causes close to their hearts, including the pursuit of higher education and the improvement and beautification of educational institutions.

"While Midland College continues to be one of the most affordable post-secondary institutions, many area residents postpone their education because they cannot afford the annual costs of \$2,400 for tuition, fees and books," Midland College President David Daniel said. "The financial support of Frances and Jack Brown will change the lives not only of these students but also those of their children and future generations."

Mrs. Brown, who has a long commitment to the educational and economic health of the community, reaffirmed her belief in the benefits of the scholarship named in her honor. "**I am pleased that this gift will help Midland College students, who would otherwise struggle with college costs, get a college education,**" she said.

The scholarship will assist students who do not qualify for federal or state assistance or other forms of financial aid. Often these students are men and women with families to support. Without job skills, they work for low wages that prevent them from qualifying for traditional means of



assistance and scholarships.

With the new scholarship, Mrs. Brown's name will stand with her husband's, identifying them as major benefactors to Midland College.

The "**Jack E. Brown Dining Hall**" was dedicated in September 2001 after Mr. Brown contributed funds to build the 10,784-square-foot student dining hall that also houses the MC Foundation Board Room and an additional meeting room.

Mr. Brown joined the Midland College Foundation Board in 1987. To honor the contributions of Mr. Brown and his

longtime business partner, Cy Wagner, the Fine Arts Auditorium in the Allison Fine Arts Building was renamed the Wagner & Brown Auditorium in 1992. In addition to the Brown Dining Hall, the Browns have supported the Advanced Technology Center, Craddick Hall, the Chaparral Circle Endowment Fund, *Friends of the Series*, aviation programs and athletics. The Browns also have given to the "Dr. Gregory Bartha Health Sciences Scholarship."

For his philanthropy, Mr. Brown has been honored by Texas A&M University, received the Top Hand Award from the Permian Basin Petroleum Association and was named to the Petroleum Museum's Hall of Fame. In 2003, the Texas A&M University System Board of Regents approved the naming of its new chemical engineering facility after Mr. Brown. At her husband's side since their marriage in 1951, Mrs. Brown has spent much of her life following the action in the oil industry and supporting her husband and their children.

His philanthropy to the MCF included contributions to the **Leona G. & John E. Fox Science Building**, the **Advanced Technology Center**, **Nadine & Tom Craddick Hall**, **Friends of**

the Series, the **Davidson Distinguished Lecture Series** and the **Midland College Silver Anniversary**, as well as generous unrestricted gifts. A Midland resident since 1940, Mr. Moore participated in the discovery and development of numerous oil and gas fields across the United States. He remained active in both the oil industry and ranching until his death. Also, Mr. Moore was a trustee and Chairman of the Board of Brite School of Divinity and served on the Board of Directors at Texas Christian University. He also participated in the development of Midland Presbyterian Homes (Manor Park).

Frances Brown played crucial role in supporting her family through busy life in the oil business

Mary Frances Brown was born July 4, 1924 to Ruth and C.A. Van Fleet in Hondo, Texas. Sister to Mildred Van Fleet Barton and Bobby Van Fleet, Mary Frances — better know as Frances — shared an idyllic childhood with her siblings on her parents' farm in Hondo. **She reports a life filled with lots of friends in the small town and many activities with relatives, including picnics and outings to the many creeks and rivers close by.**



She graduated as valedictorian of Hondo High School and set off to secretarial school in nearby San Antonio. Hondo became a military center for training pilots during World War II, and Frances and her sister joined the local women and worked in support services at the local base. After the war, she moved to San Antonio for better work opportunities and went to work as an executive assistant to the branch manager for McKesson & Robbins Wholesale Drug Company.

While working there Frances met Jack E. Brown on a date arranged by friends. After their marriage, Jack and Frances lived in a series of Texas towns, including Sonora, Abilene and Alice. **The growing family embarked on an overseas adventure**, living in Roblecita in Venezuela and taking advantage of the opportunity for much travel in South and Central America. After a few years, the Browns returned to the United States and moved to Midland where Jack pursued a career as an engineer.

When Jack started his own oil company, Frances played a crucial role in helping to support the family by returning to the workplace. During this time, she was employed by the Midland Independent School District as a secretary at San Jacinto Junior High School. **This was a busy time as Jack was gone long hours in the oil field, and Frances was holding down the home fort with three children and a job.**

During the following years, Frances devoted her life to her family. The Browns have raised three children: Peggy Ingram of Houston; Patrick Brown of Midland; and Van Brown of Mystic, Connecticut. The Browns enjoy spending time with their 11 grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren. They both are enthusiastic about family activities, including extensive travel with family and reunions with relatives from Hondo. **When not busy parenting and grand-parenting, Mrs. Brown enjoys reading, recording family history and staying in touch with others.**

She is a member of St. Luke's United Methodist Church where she is a supporter of the music ministry "Spirit Wind." For many years, Frances was a member of the Woman's Club of Midland, a volunteer for the Museum of the Southwest, as well as serving on the Board for the Marion Blakemore Planetarium.

Foundation Board President heads numerous enterprises



Richard "Dick" T. McMillan is the new President of Midland College's Foundation Board, replacing Beverly Pevehouse, who completed her five-year presidency in 2005. **"By whatever measure you choose to evaluate success and growth: (1) students taking credit courses and successfully transferring to four-year institutions; (2) workforce development through the Advanced Technology Center and other programs; or (3) providing continuing education classes and community services, Midland College has been, and continues to be, an unqualified success over its 30-year plus history,"** McMillan said. He is president of multiple private enterprises involved in oilfield and industrial supply sales; international oilfield brokerage activities; real estate and ranching. McMillan began practicing law in Midland in 1971, and in 1974 was one of the six founding members of the firm of Cotton, Bledsoe, Tighe & Dawson, P.C. He is Of Counsel with the firm. McMillan is a founding member of the North American Securities Administrators Association Oil and Gas Interests Committee, and he currently serves on the Board of Governors for Midland Memorial Foundation. McMillan received his BBA and JD from the University of Texas at Austin.

Third family foundation joins funding of 'Midland's Legacy Scholarship'

A third Midland family foundation is joining a 20-year tradition of supporting Midland College students in their education. The **Chaparral Foundation — established by Midlander J. Harvey Herd and his late wife, Harriet** — will join the Abell-Hanger Foundation — established by the late George and Gladys Abell — and the Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust — established by the late Helen L. Greathouse — in funding **"Midland's Legacy Scholarship."**

"The Herd Family has long been advocates of education, so it is not surprising that the Chaparral Foundation joins the Abell-Hanger Foundation and the Greathouse Trust in investing in our young people so that they will become well educated, and in doing so, they will make their contributions to the community," Midland College President David E. Daniel said.

Since 1986, The Abell-Hanger Scholarship — renamed "Midland's Legacy Scholarship Program" in 2003 when the Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust became a funding partner — has supported the education of 7,500 students who have contributed 240,000 volunteer hours to more than 80 Permian Basin non-profit agencies in exchange for their Midland College scholarships.

Built on the legacy of Gladys and George Abell, **Midland's Abell-Hanger Foundation** established the Abell-Hanger Scholarship to help keep Midland's youth committed to the community. Since 1986, Abell-Hanger Foundation trustees have continued to fund that scholarship — funding that has reached \$400,000 a year. The Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust has committed to providing \$100,000 each year for the next three years. The Chaparral Foundation will provide \$15,000.

"We are pleased to join the Abell-Hanger Foundation and the Greathouse Charitable Trust to support 'Midland's Legacy Scholarship Program,'" said Chaparral Foundation Trustee Tevis Herd, the son of Harvey and Harriet.

Joining the Legacy partnership continues the family's history of supporting the community, Harvey Herd said. The family has maintained that support throughout its long association with Midland.

"Harriet and I founded the Chaparral Foundation in 1997 as a way to give back to the community that has been so good to us," he said. "We have always had an interest in supporting education — particularly through scholarships," he said.

Representatives from the Abell-Hanger Foundation and the Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust praised the decision of the Chaparral Foundation to join in funding "Midland's Legacy Scholarship."

"George and Gladys Abell valued education and sought to increase and improve the opportunities for those in our community. Over more than 20 years, the Legacy Scholarship has created numerous educational opportunities for the youth of our community. It is gratifying to find that other funders see the merits of this program and have elected to join with us in this endeavor. There may be no greater personal legacy than investing in the lives of others,"

Abell-Hanger Foundation Executive Director David Smith said.

Dona Bradley, Vice President and Trust Officer for Wells Fargo Bank, said: "We were delighted to have the opportunity to join with Midland College and the Abell-Hanger Foundation in the Legacy Scholarship Program in 2003. We feel fortunate to continue that relationship with the addition of the Chaparral Foundation and the Herd Family."

Harvey Herd came to Midland in 1937 as an oil scout and geologist and returned to town after serving in the U.S. Army Air Corps in World War II. He was married to Harriet Daniel in 1940.

Until her death in 2004, Mrs. Herd was active in the community — known for leadership in her church, the arts, service organizations and education.

Civic leader Joan Baskin praised the couple for being generous with their time and leadership — and their pocketbook. "They supported all the things that need supporting," she said.

That family support extends to a history of

giving to Midland College, which began with a gift to fund construction in 1974. Since then, the Herds have given to every MC fund-raising campaign. **The Harriet and Harvey Herd Faculty Lounge at Midland College was named in the couple's honor during the Chaparral Circle Endowment Fund (CCFEF) campaign.** Harvey Herd was a charter member of the Midland College Foundation Board — serving from 1974-1981. He also served as Foundation Board President. Tevis Herd is a current member of the Midland College Foundation Board.

In its 31-year history of giving to Midland College, the Abell-Hanger Foundation has donated more than \$16.5 million for a broad spectrum of projects at Midland College.

In 1997, the Foundation gave \$35,000 to establish Students In Philanthropy (SIP), a Midland College club that provides leadership training for students in fund-raising and grantmaking. In April, with additional support of the Abell-Hanger Foundation, SIP awarded \$19,416 in grants to area non-profit agencies for a nine-year total of \$166,379.

Gifts to Midland College by Barney Greathouse, who died in 1973, and his wife, Helen, who died in 2001, have continued for 11 years through both the Barney Greathouse Estate and the Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust — which Mrs. Greathouse established in 1997. These gifts now total more than \$3.1 million. To honor her contributions, the college's Children's Center was named the Helen L. Greathouse Children's Center in 1996.

Gladys and George Abell/Abell-Hanger Foundation, Barney and Helen Greathouse/Helen Greathouse Charitable Trust, and Harvey and Harriet Herd/Chaparral Foundation have a shared legacy of giving to Midland College. Numerous projects that have benefited from the generosity of the three families include: athletics; the Dorothy and Todd Aaron Medical Science Building; the Advanced Technology Center; the CCEF; Craddick Hall; *Friends of the Series*; the Fox Science Building; scholarships; Student Services; the Petroleum Professional Development Center; and the Williams Regional Technical Training Center in Ft. Stockton.

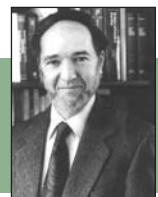
John Updike has become one of the most successful American writers. As an essayist, Updike is a gentle satirist, poking fun at American life and customs, without mean-spirited nihilism. He observes the ordinary life he sees around him and frequently asks the reader to recognize and reconsider one’s preconceptions. Updike is internationally known for his novels *Rabbit, Run*, *Rabbit Redux*, *Rabbit is Rich* and *Rabbit at Rest*. They follow the life of Harry “Rabbit” Angstrom, a star athlete, from his youth through the social and sexual upheavals of the 1960s, to later periods of his life, and to final decline. His most recent work, *Terrorist*, reports on the idea of “home grown terror.” Updike has written much criticism — including reviewing the work of such writers as Philip Roth, Saul Bellow, Kurt Vonnegut, Joyce Carol Oates, Iris Murdoch, Umberto Eco, Gabriel García Márquez, Mario Vargas Llosa, and Isabel Allende.

Texas foundations' grants to support substance abuse clinic

Grants totaling \$60,000 from two Texas foundations will support a **Midland College Counseling Clinic (MCCC)**, which will provide educational opportunities — both for MC Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling (ADAC) students and college and community members seeking substance abuse counseling services.

The **Meadows Foundation**, a private philanthropic institution based in Dallas, gave \$50,000 and the **Fasken Foundation**, an Austin-based foundation that supports education throughout the state, gave \$10,000. The funding will pay the salary of a Qualified Credentialed Counselor (QCC), who will run the MCCC — teaching and supervising the student-counselors. The money also provides funds to remodel and furnish the building that will house the clinic.

MCCC is expected to open this fall. The ADAC program at Midland College is a licensure program with the purpose of educating and training future chemical dependency counselors.

"We are very thankful to the Meadows and Fasken Foundations. Their ongoing generosity to MC will not only further enhance the quality instruction we provide in our Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counseling program, but our students and the community will directly benefit from the new substance abuse counseling services," Midland College President David E. Daniel said.

Dr. Margaret Wade, MC Math/Science Dean, also praised the clinic. "I am excited about this educational opportunity for our students in the ADAC program.

Participating in the operations of an on-campus clinic is a very unique opportunity for community college students in an

ADAC program," she said.

Chesly Herd, ADAC program director, spoke about the clinic's benefits. "Our students will benefit from the clinical setting — as will the community as a whole. The Meadows Foundation's and the Fasken Foundation's contributions are greatly appreciated; this exciting opportunity could not have happened without their generous help," she said.

The services to be provided by the MCCC fit within the mission of the Meadows Foundation and the Fasken Foundation. The **Meadows Foundation** is a private philanthropic institution established in 1948 by Algor H. and Virginia Meadows to benefit the people of Texas. The Foundation's mission is to assist the people and institutions of Texas in improving the quality and circumstances of life for themselves and future generations.

Since its inception, the Meadows Foundation has disbursed over \$550 million in grants and direct charitable expenditures to over 2,000 Texas institutions and agencies. Midland College has received \$250,000 for the Advanced Technology Center and \$100,000 for construction of the Dorothy & Todd Aaron Medical Science Building.

The **Fasken Foundation** supports scholarships and programs in many Texas colleges and universities — including Midland College. The Foundation's scholarships at MC include the Fasken Foundation Top 5% Scholarship awarded to West Texas area high school students who are in the top 5% of their graduating class.

The Foundation also supports the Fasken Foundation Graduating Sophomore Scholarship at MC to help graduates pursue a four-year degree. The Foundation has made additional gifts to MC's Petroleum Professional Development Center, the Advanced Technology Center and the Williams Regional Technical Training Center in Ft. Stockton.
